- *Masterpieces of Italian Literature in Translation*. This course introduces some of the great writers and thinkers who have shaped Italian literature and culture over a thousand years of history. The texts will be analyzed through the theme of “love, injustice and subversion”. The selected texts will contribute to an understanding of Italian history, society and culture through the analysis of the literary movements and the comparison of the most important authors and genres of each period.

- *Masterpieces of Italian Literature in Translation.* The course focused on the roots of Italian literary history through the reading and analysis of Dante Alighieri's works. Secondly, Humanism and Renaissance were introduced by means of readings from Petrarch's and Boccaccio's works. Thirdly, the epic genre of Ariosto and Macchiavelli's *Prince* and *La Mandragola*. Finally, the course examined the tradition of Italian theatre from La Commedia dell'arte to Goldoni and Pirandello.
- *Contemporary Italy through Cinema.* Through some of the most important works of Italian cinema from the master of Neo-realism to new directors such as Sorrentino and Garrone, students will investigate themes such as fascism, the Italian south, the family, the role of women, organized crime, and the consequences of economic boom. (Course taught in English)

- *Italian Culture through Songs.*
The course will reconstruct aspects of Italian society in a historical perspective, using songs which do not only reproduce reality, but they also represent it. Songs are presented using music and lyrics integrated with material such as articles, essays and videos. The teaching techniques is student-centered and include individual work, group and pair-work.
- *Italian Migrant Literature.*
These days Italy boasts a healthy crop of decorated “hyphenated” writers, the offspring of the last three decades of immigration: Senegalese Italians, Albanian-Italians, Algerian-Italians, Somali Italians, Indo-Italians, etc. This course offers students the opportunity to study this new field of Italian Literature. By analyzing the language and experience of these authors, students will appreciate the path to integration among many different cultures within one country, discovering that in literary fiction, language and experience, otherness and identity, tolerance and intolerance coexist.
- *Narratives on Women, Art, and Society: Artemisia Gentileschi and Anna Banti.* In the first part of the course students learn about who Artemisia was from the perspective of art history examining first-hand her paintings and documents from her life. In the second part students read the book on Artemisia Gentileschi that art historian and writer Anna Banti wrote in 1947. Students analyze the strategies used by Banti to interpret and elaborate the historical figure of Artemisia. (Course taught in English)
- *Race in Ancient Mediterranean.* This course explores the multi-ethnic dimensions of the Roman world with an emphasis on the Imperial period. From Rome beginnings, its population was characterized by cultural diversity, and one of the Empire greatest strengths was its ability to integrate diverse peoples into Roman political, social and cultural life. In this course, we explore the complex processes of social and cultural negotiation between local identities and Romanization that resulted from Roman expansion. (Course taught in English)
- *Classical Mythology.* The course examines the nature and social function of Greek and Roman mythology, studying several different ancient and modern theories that attempt to account for this seemingly universal phenomenon. Also considered is the legacy of classical mythology in modern art and literature, including popular culture. This course provides students with the tools to understand other myths, both ancient and modern. Students encounter ancient myths through a variety of primary sources.

- Responsible to teach Italian 100, 101, 102, 201, 202, and the intensive courses of Italian 103 and 203. Developed lesson plans and instructional programs to meet students' needs. Utilized whole Italian language approach in the classroom and a variety of activities to emphasize and develop students' abilities.
- *Introduction to Italian Culture.* This interdisciplinary course introduces students to the major social, cultural, artistic, and intellectual trends in modern Italy. Focusing on the period of Italy's history from Unification in 1861 to the present, the courses will focus on cultural topics such as Italian food and wine culture, sports, Mafia, cinema, religion, regional differences, gender issues, and the advent of a contemporary multicultural society. (Course taught in English)
